MODULE 1

6 – 17 January 2014



AT 610 – Practice of Pastoral Counseling 1

Dr. Walt Stuart

(3 ECTS)

All church leaders, especially pastors, are involved in the lives of people. To be involved in their lives means that they are also involved in their struggles and problems. For this reason, Tyndale offers a pastoral counseling course which teaches various theories, approaches, principles and techniques with the intent to help the student develop helping skills related to implementing a biblical approach to counseling. Common counseling problems are considered.

ST 710 – Ecclesiology

(3 ECTS)

In Matthew 16:18, the Lord Jesus said, “I will build my Church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.” So, what is this Church that the Lord promised to build? What does the Bible tell us about this Church? This class will provide an in-depth examination of the biblical doctrine of ecclesiology (the doctrine of the Church) primarily from Ephesians as well as an overview of ecclesiology as it developed from ancient to modern times. Students also will examine the major forms of church government and the main views of the Lord’s Supper.

ST 635 – Soteriology

(3 ECTS)

This intensive course investigates the Christian doctrine of salvation together with the preparatory topics within theology of who can be saved (doctrine of humanity) and why salvation is necessary (doctrine of sin). Who does the saving (doctrines of God and of the person of Christ) and how salvation is made possible (doctrine of the work of Christ - the atonement) are treated in other courses in the Tyndale curriculum.

MODULE 2

AT 630 – Marriage & Family

Dr. Cecil Stalnaker

(3 ECTS)

Since Christianity is based in many ways on godly and sound families, it is important that Christian leaders in the local church have a good grasp of the biblical and theological understanding of marriage and family issues. In order to equip them to better help the families in their churches, this course is centered around three aspects specifically related to ministry: (1) biblical and theological definitions of marriage and family; (2) views on marriage and divorce, homosexuality; (3) a study of the Scriptures and their application in relation to pastoral counseling in reference to marriage and divorce, marital preparation, homosexuality, singleness, sexuality, child rearing and parental guidance.

WE 672 – Preaching Christ in a Post-Modern Culture

The way reality is perceived and explained has changed enormously over the last half century, greatly impacting European and Western societies. Postmodernism has arisen in reaction to the perceived shortcomings of modernism, and as a product of developments in the philosophy of language and science, sociology, and the arts. Theology has been deeply impacted by this postmodern shift. Although postmodernism has helped the contemporary world critically examine itself, it is not without its dangers.

WE 855 – Urban Ministry

(3 ECTS)

The world is more than 50% urban (Europe is 75%) and migration is impacting every country. The influence of urbanization and urbanism requires every pastor and missionary to be able to read the city and understand its global / local nature. This course offers an introduction to anthropological and sociological methods together with the creation of a biblical theology and missiology of the city. The course will involve interviews and exposures to cross-cultural churches and mission projects in Rotterdam where the professor is a city-center minister. At the end of this course, every student will be able to outline a basic biblical theology of the city, articulate about urban issues such as poverty and pluralism, be able to apply demographics and practical research methods to create an effective urban mission strategy.

MODULE 3

PM 525 – Pastoral Ministry

(3 ECTS)

Being involved in local church ministry demands specific pastoral skills for effective ministry. For this reason the course will consider the pastor’s call, shepherding and leading people in the church, pastoral visitation, pastor’s tasks, planning and conducting worship services, personal life (family, pastor’s wife and children), special events in the church, weddings, funerals, child dedications, relations in the community and with other churches, harmony and reconciliation in the church, church business meetings, financial stewardship, administration, prayer in the church, and general education in the church.

AT 615 – Practice of Pastoral Counseling 2

Seniors experience many of the same problems that young people do. Aging adds a new set of challenges so that “God’s older children” can be more prone to suffer from depression, grief, separation anxiety (when separated from spouse, other family, or friends because of illness, etc.), and end-of-life dilemmas. Our course will explore ways to offer effective pastoral counseling in these and other situations.
